Mayor's Message Back to School Safety

It's Back-to-School season, and whether or not your household has kids in school, everyone in the community can do their part to help with safety.

Draper City provides crossing guards, school resource officers, and other support for our schools. Safety is our top priority, including crosswalks, traffic enforcement, and pedestrian routes to school. These things are evaluated each year.

Our partners at Canyons School District have invited the community to participate in a new safety awareness initiative— Canyons Safety Squad. The information they have shared with us from this campaign can apply to all schools and school zones within Draper.

The Canyons Safety Initiative is built on six key "Safety Zone" Pillars"

Driver Awareness

Drivers are reminded to slow down in school zones and on school grounds, obey crossing guards, and stay off cell phones. Speed limits are reduced near schools for a reason — because

children are present.

Pedestrian Safety

Students and families are encouraged to use marked crosswalks and make eye contact with drivers before stepping into the street. Always listen to the instructions of crossing guards.

Bus Safety

It's not only illegal but incredibly risky to pass a school bus with red flashing lights. Drivers must stop completely and wait until the red flashing lights turn off and the bus begins to move again.

E-Bike & Scooter Safety

As electric scooters and bikes become more popular, students and families should

know their city's laws about helmet usage, age limits, and sidewalk restrictions. Parents are asked to "know the code" and teach it to their children.

Group Safety

Students are safer when they walk in groups and stay visible. Families can create "walking school buses" or coordinate bike groups to help kids travel together.

Drop-Off Rules

Each school has specific instructions for morning drop-offs and afternoon pick-ups. Parents should follow signs, pull forward when

home. From choosing the safest walking route to reinforcing the importance of being alert near traffic, families are being asked to practice safety together and talk through what safe travel looks like.

We hope that everyone in the

community will consider how they can contribute to help improve school safety.

Concerning E-bikes and scooters, our police department is in the process of putting together information to present to the council regarding safety concerns and possible amendments that could be made to

the city code to help. We will provide any updates via the city communication channels.

RECYCLED MATERIALS REPORT JANUARY 1 - JUNE 30, 2025

Curbside Recycling

During the 6-month period from January 1 to June 30, 2025, our recycling trucks have picked up 802.3 tons of recyclables from your curbside blue lid recycling containers. We refer to this as mixed load collection because it includes plastic bottles, metal cans, corrugated cardboard, and paper. Each day we deliver these mixed loads to Rocky Mountain Recycling Services in Salt Lake City. Rocky Mountain Recycling is a material recovery facility (MRF). They use a state-of-the-art sort line, as well as trained staff to ensure that as much recyclable material as possible is reclaimed. The sorted cardboard, paper, plastic, and metal is then baled and sent to various production mills across the country to be made into new products.

Mixed Load Contamination

Rocky Mountain Recycling runs a test sort each month where our driver empties the load in an open area and

then a recycling staff member sorts through the truck load and determines how much is recyclable and how much is contamination, meaning materials that cannot be recycled. Our average during this 6-month period is 13.68% contamination, which means 13.68% of what we pickup in curbside containers is not recyclable. This is where we need your help.

What can I put in my recycling can?


Cardboard (please flatten boxes), paper, newspaper, cereal boxes, toilet roll and paper towel tubes, aluminum cans, steel cans, plastic containers with necks/lids. The recycling can is for loose materials only—don't put recyclable items in bags.

Keep these things out of your bluelid recycling can!

Plastic bags of any kind, fast food containers, greasy or soiled wrappers and packaging, wax-coated cardboard, Styrofoam, packing peanuts, bubble wrap, yard waste, and glass.

Corrugated Cardboard

In addition to the mixed loads from your curbside cans, we also have two single-stream drop-off containers. One for corrugated cardboard at the Public Works facility (72 E Sivogah Ct), and the other for glass at City Hall (1020 E Pioneer Rd). During this 6-month period, Draper residents have recycled 17.98 tons of corrugated



cardboard. Keep in mind that cardboard doesn't weigh very much. A 30-yard dumpster where the cardboard has been compacted weighs an average of 1.97 tons. Corrugated cardboard is also delivered to Rocky Mountain Recycling for processing.

Glass

From the dumpster at City Hall we have recycled 64.23 tons of glass. We take the glass to Momentum Recycling, where it is cleaned, dried, and crushed, then sorted into various sizes ranging from pebbles to sand and even powder, depending on its end market. Momentum offers monthly curbside glass recycling in Draper. For rates and pickup schedule, contact them directly at (801) 355-0334 or sign up online at utah.momentumrecycling.com/

GLASS RECYCLING SERVICE IS CHANGING

You don't have to haul your bottles anywhere to keep them out of the landfill. Momentum Recycling offers curbside pickup for all your glass bottles and jars—jam, pickle, salsa, you name it. Your glass gets transformed into new products instead of waste.

If You've Been Recycling, This Is What's Changing

Until now, your glass recycling service has been billed via Draper City, as a line item on your public utility bill, and Momentum Recycling has provided the service. Going forward, Momentum Recycling will bill you directly for glass recycling service. Nothing will change in the service itself; collection will still occur on the same day, and you will still receive a reminder text or email the day before. You will simply pay Momentum Recycling directly, rather than paying Draper City.

What You Need to Do

You will need to create an account directly with Momentum Recycling,

at momentumrecycling.com. During this process, you will be asked to enter a payment method for the monthly fee. This will need to be completed by September 15 in order to ensure that your glass recycling service continues uninterrupted.

If You Have Not Been Recycling Glass Yet, You Can Start Here

Sign up in minutes at utah.momentumrecycling.com/draper or scan the QR code below. You'll get a monthly pickup on the same day each month, plus a reminder the day before. Simple, clean, and good for the planet—right from your driveway.

Don't forget, there are two glass recycling bins located in Draper, one

on the east side of the City Hall parking lot (1020 E. Pioneer Rd.) and the other at IKEA (67 W. IKEA Way).

FIRE STATION 22

Station 22 is home to Engine 22 and Medic Ambulance 22. It is typically staffed with six personnel and a Battalion Chief. They operate these two apparatuses, as well as a brush truck and UTV side-by-side. Their calls vary from standard medical calls, hang-glider accidents, motor vehicle accidents, and more. Their response district is the southern end of the city, including Corner Canyon and a portion of Traverse Ridge Road.

During their 48-hour shifts, they are responsible for responding to calls, medical and fire training, and other duties to help facilitate the function of the department.

On a structure fire, an Engine Company is responsible for stretching the fire hose inside the structure to extinguish the fire. This is very strenuous work when fully geared up for a fire. Their gear weighs approximately eighty pounds, and the weight of the hose can vary. Our main fire attack line weighs roughly ninety pounds for every one hundred feet. Our two and a half inch hose weighs roughly two hundred and sixty pounds for every one hundred feet. Physical fitness is incredibly important to the fire department so they can operate under severe conditions with significant weight.

Draper City's application is to renew our status as a Bronze Level BCF, one of nine certified BCF's in the state. Your input will help the League and applicant communities to better understand current bicycling

As the election gets closer, Draper City will release vote-center and early vote locations.



HALLOWEEN SAFETY

Soon the leaves will change color and everything will be infused with pumpkin spice. As we gear up for spooky season, we want everyone to have fun. While costumes and haunted houses are a blast, it's important to prioritize safety. From ensuring costumes are visible in the dark to choosing well-lit routes for trick-or-treating, small precautions can make a big difference. By being mindful of safety, everyone can enjoy the Halloween spirit while keeping the holiday fun and secure for all.

Trick-or-Treating

Children should be supervised at all Times. Use flashlights to illuminate walking surfaces and provide motorists notice of your location from a greater distance. Attaching glowsticks to costumes can increase their visibility in the dark.

Trick-or-treat in groups, in familiar neighborhoods and, when possible, while it's still light outside. Map out your route in advance, and always walk on sidewalks and cross at crosswalks, looking both ways before crossing.

Costumes

Check that costumes are flame retardant, and hemmed to be short enough to prevent trips and falls. Wear light-colored costumes and use

reflective materials or tape to help maintain visibility.

Avoid costumes that have weapons. If they are part of the costume, make sure they are made from cardboard or flexible materials. If possible, try using makeup instead of masks.

Parents

Teach children to never go into a stranger's house or vehicle. If your child has a cell phone, make sure they are familiar with local emergency numbers and 911.

Teach children not to eat any treats until they get home. To avoid temptation, give children a snack before they go out trick-or-treating. Be careful with fruit and homemade treats — discard them if you don't know the person who gave them. Check all treats and eat only unopened candy in original wrappers.






Build Your FutureA Bilingual Program Sets Up Students for Success
