Mayor's Message Conservation Easement and New Trails

In 2012, Draper City purchased 2,400 acres of property from Zions Bank. This has come to be known as the SunCrest purchase. We paid Zions \$5.6 million for the property — \$2,240 per acre — with a sales tax revenue bond for the purchase. We took the risk because this was a fortuitous opportunity to purchase a literal mountain at a deep discount. This property was slated for homes and, had it been developed, would have added thousands more houses to the SunCrest development.

When purchased, we identified a few parcels to sell for development, including 100 acres next to Highland City and 255 acres along Deer Ridge Road. Several years after we purchased the land, we sold 110 acres located by Highland City for \$7.3 million and used the proceeds to pay off the bond and build new trails and trailheads, including Coyote Hollow, Peak View, and Deer Ridge Trailhead. The land in Deer Ridge already had utilities installed going up the mountain, so it made sense to sell it for housing. As we considered the geologic issues with the property, we decided not to sell and make it part of our open space.

Most of Draper's open space on the mountain is held in a

conservation easement by Salt Lake County, ensuring its protection in perpetuity; it will never be developed, and our citizens can enjoy it forever. On June 17, 2025, we held a ceremony with Salt Lake County to formally place the 255 acres into the conservation easement. With this addition the City has approximately 5,000 acres of dedicated open space held in the easement, helping make Draper the best place to live in Utah.

The Deer Ridge area is exploding with new trails and more opportunities for our citizens to enjoy this amazing mountain, including:

Beware of Doug Trail, a 1.25-mile multi-use, single-track, dirt trail loop in the upper area of the Deer Ridge Dog Off-Leash Area (aka Far Side Trails), is our fourth city dog park, allowing dogs to be off-leash in a mountain setting. Unique to be sure! Dogs must be under visual and voice control. The loop provides scenic views of Salt Lake and Utah valleys and is popular with all trail users, especially hikers and bikers with off-leash dogs.

Rex Maneuver Foot Path is a 1.0mile foot-only, single-track, dirt trail loop in the upper area of the Deer Ridge Dog Off-Leash Area, allowing dogs to be off leash under visual and voice control. With scenic views of both Salt Lake and Utah valleys, the trail is popular with all users.

Mayor's Trail is a 2.2-mile multiuse, single-track dirt trail along the southern ridgeline of Traverse Mountain, from Lolo (Lehi) to Traverse Trail, and connects to Lehi's Dream Bike Trail in Lehi. It provides several trail loop options through its connections to Draper and Lehi City's trail systems, and is a direct result



of my great relationship with Lehi Mayor Mark Johnson. Our goal is to connect our cities via the two amazing trail systems and give citizens of both cities the ability to see the entire mountain. Lehi and Mayor Johnson have been amazing partners.

Currently under construction, Off the Beaten Path will be a hiking/horse-only trail beginning at the Deer Ridge Trailhead and circumnavigating the entire offleash area. Dogs must be on leash. We hope to have it open by the beginning of July.

Also under construction, **Dobbins** Way Trail will be a multi-use trail beginning .40 miles down Maple Hollow North, crossing over to the Mayor's Trail. We hope to have it open by mid-July.

I am grateful to former Mayor Darrell Smith for his leadership, and to people like Clark Naylor, Ann Parr, and others who saw the value of a trail system back when having a trail was no big deal, and this valley was not full. They were champions of trails and open space, Corner Canyon and our exceptional quality of life.

I am grateful to have been part of the city council that made the SunCrest purchase, along with council members Jeff Stenquist, Bill Rappleye, Alan Summerhays, and Bill Colbert. I am grateful to our current council, Tasha Lowery, Marsha Vawdrey, Mike Green, Bryn Johnson, and Fred Lowry, who have an unwavering commitment to preserving our open space and building trails. They understand its value and how unique Draper is because of our canyon.

I hope you all have a wonderful summer and can get out on the trails. Use the new trailheads and enjoy our amazing open space.

DRAPER CITY ANIMAL SERVICES TRAIL SAFETY, HOT VEHICLES, AND PETS

Pets are especially vulnerable to summer heat. One of the most serious risks is leaving an animal in a parked car. Interior temperatures can spike in minutes leading to heatstroke, severe health issues, or death. Never leave your pet unattended—always prioritize their safety and well-being.

To enjoying trails or hikes with pets, extra precautions are necessary. Some tips include:

1) Provide fresh, cool water. Carry a water bottle and silicone bowl for hydration.

- 2) Frequently rest in shaded areas, especially during peak heat hours.
- 3) Use wet towels, cooling mats, or cooling vests to regulate your pet's body temperature.
- 4) Hot pavement can burn paws. Check the ground temperature with your hand and stick to grass/ dirt trails when possible.
- 5) Walk your dog in the early morning or late evening when it's cooler outside.
- 6) Keep walks short and avoid

strenuous activity on particularly

- 7) Look for signs such as excessive panting, drooling, fatigue, or difficulty breathing.
- 8) Use pet-safe sunscreen and/ or lightweight, reflective pet clothing to prevent sunburn.
- 9) Dog booties can shield paws from hot surfaces and burns.

By following these guidelines, you can help ensure your pet stays cool, comfortable, and safe all summer long.

If you've ever visited the Ballard Arena on a summer evening after sunset, you'll understand why it's one of my favorite spots in the city. Peaceful and scenic, it offers stunning views and captures the spirit of our community.

The arena was built in 1996 as part of Corner Canyon Park. According to the Deseret News, "The park, located in the South Mountain development at 13500 South and 1600 East, includes a full equestrian arena with room for future bleachers and stables. The land was donated to Draper by the developers of the 1,700-unit South Mountain subdivision as part of their development agreement with the city. The developers also spent about \$800,000 on site improvements. Salt Lake County contributed \$100,000 for construction of the equestrian arena." Later additions by Draper City included the restrooms and concessions building, expanded

bleachers and parking, picnic tables and a large sunshade.

Today, the arena is home to several exciting annual events, including the Draper Days Rodeo, Horse Pull, Monster Truck rally, and potentially even a Demolition Derby. These events are made possible by the hard work of the 11-member Special Events Arena Committee and our great City staff responsible for organizing and staffing.

Earlier this year, KSL highlighted that Utah ranked #1 in the nation for volunteering since tracking began in 2002. Giving back strengthens our community and fosters a sense of connection and belonging.

Draper City currently has six official 11-member Commissions and Committees, along with at least four auxiliary groups—providing many opportunities for residents to get involved and make a difference.

Another meaningful way to contribute is by supporting our local businesses. Recently, our sales tax revenue has seen a decline, which directly affects the City's ability to fund important services. By choosing to shop and dine locally, we help sustain a vibrant, thriving community where people love to live and work.

2025 MUNICIPAL PRIMARY ELECTION

Draper City will conduct its Municipal Primary Election on Tuesday, August 12, 2025.

This will be a vote-by-mail election. Ballots will be mailed to all active, registered voters beginning the week of July 22, 2025. Ballots must be received by August 12, 2025, to be counted. Please mail your ballot early to avoid delays.

Primary Election ballots will include candidates for the two-year city council term. Utah County residents in Draper will also have school board candidates on their ballots. There are not enough candidates for the four-year city council term or mayoral seat to hold a primary election. Those candidates will be included on the ballot for the General Election.

A secure ballot drop box is available in the south parking lot of Draper City Hall for convenient ballot drop-off.

To ensure you receive your ballot, verify or update your voter registration at vote.utah.gov. You can also see candidate information and view a sample ballot at that website.

Draper City Hall will serve as an official voting location:

- Early voting will be held August 5–8, 2025, from 3:00 PM to 7:00 PM.
- On Election Day, August 12, 2025, polls will be open from 7:00 AM to 8:00 PM.
