Mayor's Message Sales Tax Revenue Decline Impacting City Budget



When I was first elected to serve in Draper, one of my top priorities was economic development, specifically growing the sales tax base. It is no accident that we have a robust business community In Draper. We have been deliberate

and focused on solid economic growth. A consistent stream of sales tax revenue has been a major factor in keeping our property taxes low.

On August 20, the City Council approved the fiscal year 2024-25 final budget. As you know, that budget included the first property tax increase by Draper City in over 17 years. That increase went to public safety, and we needed it. Before the tax increase, we were the lowest-taxed city in Salt Lake County and now, we are second lowest by a narrow margin.

The City has been relying on regular growth of our sales tax revenue to keep property tax low. The consistent growth has allowed us to meet our needs.

Draper City receives on average about 30% of our total sales tax revenue from the state-wide local government pool, which is allocated based on population. But the majority of our sales tax revenue comes directly from sales made within Draper City. This is why it is so important to shop and pay for services in Draper as much as possible.

Over the past few years, our sales tax



revenue growth has flattened out. Without growth like we have previously had, the City could not meet rising costs. This flattened growth has put a strain on the budget.

We know that inflation has affected everyone, and spending is generally down, but I hope that whatever you do spend money on, you spend as much of it as you can in Draper. If you need a new/ used car, appliance, furniture, groceries, home improvements, salon services, etc., please consider a Draper business first. Online sales to Draper addresses also count.

In addition to flattening sales tax revenue, a few other significant changes have reduced the City's portion of tax revenue. First, the ongoing census of our population has shown we have gone from 51,017 people in 2020 to 49,602 people in May of 2024. This shift is estimated to negatively affect revenues between \$200,000 to \$400,000 annually because we now get less of the statewide sales tax pool.

Second, a bill passed during the 2023 Utah legislative session redistributed a portion of the sales taxes, generated by sand and gravel sales to a specific fund that can only be spent on road maintenance near and around sand and gravel operations. For fiscal year 2024, \$575,000 was diverted to this fund and thus taken out of or general sales tax revenue stream. Before the 2023 law, cities took all sales tax revenue into our general fund and used it where it was needed.


So, the reduced population has cut our share of the statewide sales tax pool and the law diverting sand and gravel sales tax to the road fund has dropped our general fund sales tax revenue between \$700-\$900K.

The Utah State Legislature voted to move the prison west of Salt Lake City.

May 2018

The Legislature passed HB 372, which created The Point of the Mountain State Land Authority (POMSLA). POMSLA governs the prison site development, and Draper Mayor Troy Walker serves on the board.

July 2022

After 70+ years in operation, the Draper prison facility closed.

November 2022

Demolition of the old prison site began with the toppling of a guard

Here is a brief timeline outlining The

August 2023

tower.

The final prison tower was demolished. The only structure remaining is a chapel constructed by inmates in the 1960s and saved for historical preservation.

November 2023

POMSLA entered into a development agreement with The Point Partners — a group of local and national developers — to lead out on Phase I.

March 2024

Infrastructure development commenced after the Legislature appropriated \$108 million for "backbone infrastructure."

2025 and Onward

Phase I development is expected to begin as soon as 2025, including a Central Park, regional trail connections, and a balanced mix of jobs, housing, shopping, and entertainment.

We have come a long way. The

Point presents unique challenges for Draper. How will public safety services be provided? Who will pay for the cost of those services? How will The Point impact traffic congestion, home values and our quality of life? We are fortunate to have Mayor Walker on the board advocating for Draper and I am confident we will successfully navigate these issues.

The Point still represents a generational opportunity to drive economic growth, generate highpaying jobs, provide quality starter homes and create incredible public/ civic spaces. I am optimistic for our future! For more details on The Point, visit thepointutah.org.

DRAPER CITY RECYCLED MATERIALS REPORT JANUARY 1, 2024 - JUNE 30, 2024

Curbside Recycling

During the six month period from January 1 to June 30, 2024 our recycling trucks have picked up 821.26 tons of recyclables from your curbside blue lid recycling containers. We call this mixed load collection because it contains plastic bottles, metal cans, corrugated cardboard, and paper. Each day we deliver these mixed loads to Rocky Mountain Recycling Services in Salt Lake City. Rocky Mountain Recycling is a material recovery facility (MRF). They use a state-of-the-art sort line, as well as trained staff to ensure that as much recyclable material as possible is reclaimed. The sorted cardboard, paper, plastic, and metal is then baled and sent to various production mills across the country to be made into new products.

Mixed Load Contamination

Rocky Mountain Recycling runs a test sort each month where our driver empties the load in an open area. Then a recycling staff member sorts through the truck load and determines how much is recyclable and how much is contamination, meaning materials that cannot be recycled. Our average during this six month period is 13.14% contamination, which means 13.14% of what we pickup in curbside

paper, newspaper, cereal boxes, toilet roll and paper towel tubes, aluminum for loose materials only — don't put recyclable items in bags.


Keep these things out of your bluelid recycle can!

wrappers and packaging, wax

coated cardboard, Styrofoam, packing peanuts, bubble wrap, yard waste, and glass.

Corrugated Cardboard

In addition to the mixed loads from your curbside cans, we also have two single stream drop off containers: one for corrugated cardboard at the Public Works facility (72 E Sivogah Ct), and the other for glass at City Hall (1020 E Pioneer Rd). During this six month period, Draper residents have recycled 17.63 tons of corrugated cardboard.



Keep in mind that cardboard doesn't weigh very much. A 30 yard dumpster where the cardboard has been compacted weighs an average of 1.97 tons. Corrugated cardboard is also delivered to Rocky Mountain Recycling for processing.

Glass

All residents of Utah County are welcome to attend an open

house, where county departments will share insights on the

services they provide. This will offer a transparent look at how tax

dollars are used and the community services they provide.

From the dumpster at City Hall we have recycled 83.83 tons of glass. We take the glass to Momentum Recycling where it is cleaned, dried and crushed, then sorted into various sizes ranging from pebbles to sand, and even powder depending on its end market. 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

Costumes

Check that costumes are flame retardant, and hemmed to be short enough to prevent trips and falls. Wear light-colored costumes and use reflective materials or tape to help maintain visibility.

Avoid costumes that have weapons. If they are part of the costume, make sure they are made from cardboard or flexible materials. If possible, try using makeup instead of masks.

Parents

Teach children to never go into a stranger's house or vehicle. If your child has a cell phone, make sure they are familiar with local emergency numbers and 911

Teach children not to eat any treats until they get home. To avoid temptation, give children a snack before they go out trick-or-treating. Be careful with fruit and homemade treats — discard them if you don't know the person who gave them. Check all treats and eat only unopened candy in original wrappers.
